## **Antiquing Across America Again**

My wife, Shirley, was always interested in antiques, but I wanted something new having grown up with nothing but old stuff. She bought an old pot belly stove that I ended up refurbishing and I started getting a little interested. In 1984 we built a new two story house and put antique light fixtures and ceiling fans throughout the house and one of the bathrooms with the tank pull chain toilet and claw foot bathtub. We put the living area on the bottom floor with a large Recreation room in the back for the antiques, with an antique soda fountain telephone booth and Shirley's wicker collection. The upstairs was just a large attic, but had regular walk up staircase.

In decorating the house we met a couple who owned an antique store who got Shirley started collecting tobacco tins (I joined her later) and through them I met a retired race car driver who was restoring juke boxes and coke machines. After acquiring two of his juke boxes and a third later I started collecting 78 records building a nice collection of the 50's rock & roll records. I retired in 1997 at the ripe age of 59 and our collecting became a passion. Every couple of months we would take the Van on a swing through the East (Not much old stuff in Oklahoma) filling it with various goodies. It soon became apparent that the Recreation room wouldn't hold everything.

I had a friend who did great remodels so we started planning how to finish out the upstairs to become a General Store. He covered it with lap an gap pine and Pergo hardwood floors with special shelves for the various collections. Added a tin ceiling over one area and my antique fan man added some fans. I found what I call my cowboy bathtub where you set in it an hang your legs and feet over the front and actually hooked it up to running water. As we started each antique trip it seemed I had acquired quite a bit in a various collection and would start a new one.

From my original record collection I moved to collecting painted label soda bottles and after some 1500 different bottles I decided enough was enough. That led to collecting bottle toppers and soda displays and collections of popcorn tins, soap items, candy boxes, sack holders, advertising tapes, needle books and old cigarette packs for the general area. Razor blade boxes, blade banks, barber displays and a barber chair for the Barber Shop area. Red Goose, Buster Brown and other shoe display items for the Shoe Dept. Football, Baseball, the first Sports Illustrated magazines and old sports games for the Sports Dept. A game area for old card games and board games. An old tobacco case became available for the pocket tins and cigar boxes.

My main love is still the soda collection which I pretty much dedicated the back room of the store to bottle toppers and soda displays. Shirley's main passion has become collecting antique Santa's which results in several hundred eyes watching me throughout the Christmas season. I am now out of room again, but not planning on expanding, just have to be more selective in what I acquire and it has to stand alone as there is no more wall space.
